



Book Report for January 2021

This month I am reviewing "Floral Bouquet Quilts" by Sharon Evan Yenter. This is a lovely book of patterns using floral fabrics. It took me a while to review the book because I thought it was old fashioned. Maybe I'm getting old fashioned too. It features all kinds of florals; chintz, toile, stripes, rose, paisley and more. The chapter includes a good analysis of the color wheel and it's uses. I found this very helpful. Her instructions are very clear. She has included advice on decorating with the quilts.

There is a pattern called Gingersnap Nine Patch. This is a simple pattern but very attractive. Then there's Trippy Floral. This quilt I have made. It is lovely. I did make some changes but they did not make a big difference. I also made "Oceans of Flowers". Another lovely quilt. I would recommend this book to anyone. (I did find it hard to find the floral I liked. Not every quilt shop carries them.). There's always ordering on line. I will put this book in the library when I can get in.

"Happy Trails To You"

Recently, my daughter and a few of her friends met in western North Carolina for a "Week Away". On one of their excursions, they happened upon a site my daughter had become familiar with – a quilt block - in a not so familiar place! Over the years, my daughter (guilty by association) has become acquainted with quilt blocks, quilts, quilt names, all things quilting really, almost to the point of complacency. On this eye-opening trip she became so excited at seeing her first "Barn Quilt" she called me, secure in the knowledge that she had just discovered a prehistoric quilt drawing!

How many of you have ever seen a Barn Quilt, or driven a Barn Quilt Trail, or know what a Barn Quilt Trail is? A "Quilt Trail" is a series of painted wood or metal quilt blocks, freestanding or hung from a building. The blocks are hung along a route emphasizing significant architecture or aesthetic landscapes. Barn quilts connect the history, culture and fabric of communities. Currently North America has 46 quilt trails: 43 in the United States and three in Canada.

North Carolina has nine Barn Quilt trails in many counties, some formally organized and mapped and others in the development stage at a local level, including in Western Rowan County. As of July 8, 2019 Mount Ulla, NC installed the largest community barn quilt in the United States. It resides on the wall of a local store, the West Rowan Farm, Home & Garden. The Mount Ulla Community Barn Quilt measures 500 square feet, 25 square feet larger than the previous title holder, a community Barn Quilt in Ashland, Kansas.



The concept of barn quilts originated with Donna Sue Groves and her wish to honor her mother, Maxine, and her Appalachian heritage by having a painted quilt hung on her barn in Adams County, Ohio, in 2001. After several years, her work with the Ohio Arts Council and other community organizations inspired Donna Sue to alter her plan. Rather than creating a personal tribute, a "sampler" of twenty quilt squares was created along a driving trail drawing visitors to travel through the countryside. And so it happened that the first quilt square on the American Quilt Trail does not hang at the Groves farm. An "Ohio Star" was painted by local artists and installed on a building at a greenhouse nearby, a location that allowed for a public celebration of the inauguration of the quilt trail. A "Snail's Trail" quilt square was later painted by an artist and mounted on the Groves' barn.

Quilt trails are created by quilt guilds, civic groups, local arts councils, 4-H clubs, school groups, and other organizations. Most are a countywide effort, which allows for a distinct trail in a single area and creates local pride in the project. The project that started out as a tribute to a beloved mother, morphed into a series of 20 quilts that became a driving tour, drawing visitors to the area, increasing tourism and bringing local heritage to the forefront. This simple idea has spread to 48 states and to Canada, and the trail continues to grow. Now, over 7000 quilts are part of organized trails & dozens more are scattered through the countryside waiting to be discovered.

Quilt Trails of Western North Carolina has developed 10 itineraries for self-guided tours. Booklets detailing the tours are available at One-of-a-Kind Gallery in Micaville *(ooakartgallery.com)*, which serves as the home base for the organization. Now, more than 300 quilt squares make up the Quilt Trails of Western North Carolina, mostly in Yancey, Mitchell and Haywood counties and the surrounding areas.

Ashe County has developed six drivable trails to showcase its own quilt trail (ashecountyarts.org), many of which were created by Syndi and Renee Brooks. The pair teach barn quilt-making and sell barn quilt supplies at their West Jefferson studio, Two Quilt Girls (ilovebarnquilts.com).



Colorful barn quilts can be found throughout North Carolina and nationwide. Just a few resources:

<u>Clay County:</u> This quilt trail is an ongoing project with its beginning in downtown Hayesville, where the first barn quilt, the Triple Sunflower, was installed in 2017.

<u>Franklin & Martin Counties:</u> Quilt Trails of the Tar and Roanoke Rivers includes installations in Franklin, Martin and soon Pitt counties.

Person County: What began as an idea in 2015 now amounts to quilt blocks adorning barns, sheds and businesses across Person County.

Randolph County: This trail features dozens of quilt blocks — keep an eye out for bees, flowers and cows hidden in some. A "Trail Gallery" link lists installations on a map.

Yadkin County: Follow a map to spot 50 colorful quilts on barns and businesses throughout Yadkin County.

When planning a nationwide road trip, search by state and county to find barn quilts along your route.
