

The book I am reviewing is "Easy Paper-Pieced Baby Quilts" by Carol Doak. Since we donate quilts to two hospitals and the Christian Adoption Services I thought it appropriate I review a book of baby quilts.

This book is like a primer for paper-piecing. The instructions are clear and simple. There are plenty of diagrams to help you along. Some of the patterns could be used on quilts other than baby quilts like hearts and trees. I think you will find it very useful. Give it a try.


Tips, Tricks & Techniques



Looking for a way to keep track of where you are in a pattern or mark a place you are having issues. **FRIXION** now comes in pens, highlighters and markers in multiple colors. Marks can be removed from paper by friction and from most fabric by heat. Though you should test your fabric before using on the right side. If fabric gets cold enough the mark will reappear and on darker fabrics it may leave a white mark.

Highlighter tape is also available in several colors and can be repositioned on your pattern pages to keep track of your progress or highlight places you need to take special notice.

QUILTOLOGY - SEPTEMBER 2020



DOWN

- 1. Adding fabric motifs by hand or machine to a foundation fabric.
- A method of adding raised texture to quilts by stuffing design areas, such as stems, leaves, & other motifs.
- Stitching that covers the entire quilt without regard for block shapes or fabric design.
- A machine straight stitch typically done on the right side of a project close to a seam.
- 5. Neighbors on the color wheel.
- 6. The process of stitching just next to the seams on the quilt surface.
- A pattern created when Log Cabin blocks are placed so the lights & darks radiate from the ouilt center.
- Taking a stitch through all three layers of the quilt & knotting it on the quilt surface creating a loftier quilt.
- Stitching multiple lines that follow the outline of an appliqué or other design element, copying its shape.
- The removable plate on the machine bed that covers the bobbin & has an opening for the feed dogs & needle.
- 18. The top part of the needle that is held by the machine.
- 3-dimensional gathered fabric circles that may be sewn into quilt tops or used for decorative embellishments.
- A quilt style identified by peaks & valleys created from squares of fabric that are sewn in strins, then cut & offset before ioining the

ACROSS

- 6. A quilt in which each block is a different pattern.
- A chalk bag that can be patted over a stencil to transfer a nattern to fabric.
- A fabric woven with colored threads rather than printed.
 The color is inherent in the fabric & not applied at a later
- A translucent surface that is lit from below and is used for tracing patterns onto paper or fabric.
- The number of threads woven into a fabric. A higher designates a more tightly woven fabric.
- A side-to-side stitch that can be used for machine appliqué or shortened & verv closely spaced to create a Satin
- A combination of two or more pieces of fabric sewn together that form part of a block.
- Isolating & cutting out a specific print or motif from a niece of fabric.
- A presser foot that acts in tandem with the sewing machine's feed does to evenly feed multiple layers beneath
- A basic unit, often repeated, from which many quilts are composed. May be pieced, appliquéd, or solid.
- 23. Visual or actual center of block where units come
- Lightweight, plain-woven cotton cloth, typically checked in white & a bold color.
- 25. Threads, stabilizers, or marks that dissolve when wet.

TRPQG Mystery Quilt 2020 - Covid Christmas Part One

I hope you will join us in this three part Mystery Quilt. It will begin in September and end November 2020 so I am calling this <u>Covid Christmas</u>! I plan on making my quilt in Christmas fabric but the choice is yours. Supplies needed are simple.....for your top you will need 5 yards of fabric and a little extra for binding. If you feel you might make a mistake or if the sales person cuts your fabric a little short of a yard, you will have problems so I have added a little extra of your light and dark fabrics to make sure you have enough! Also, think ahead to what you might want to use for your borders and binding. The binding could be one of the fabrics in the body of the quilt top. Get ready.....You will be making many Half Square Triangles (HST)! Your quilt will finish approximately 56" x 56".

You will need:

11/8 yards each of 2 dark fabrics (A,D)

1 yard for border (E)

11/8 yards each of 2 light fabrics (B,C)

1/2 yard for binding

4 yards for backing or 2 yards wideback fabric Twin size batting

 Note: Label your light and dark fabric so you will remember which is A,B,C,and D. It doesn't matter which light you match with which dark but you need to be consistent.

Cutting Instructions:

Fabric A,B,C,D

Cut eight strips of each fabric 4½ inches (WOF). Sub-cut sixty four 4½ x 4½ inch squares of each for your HST units for your block.

Fabric E


Cut seven strips 4½ inches, (WOF). Sub-cut four strips at 4½ x 40, two strips to 4½ x 25 inches and one strip to two 4½ x 17 inches for the borders. (Borders must be sown together in straight seams...not on the bias. Instructions for that will be given later.)

Binding

Cut seven strips at 21/4 inches and join each piece with mitered seams.

Making the blocks!

- Take one each of the 4½ x 4½ squares of fabric A and C and place them right sides together (RST). With a pencil draw a diagonal line from one corner to the other on all the light squares.
- Sew a seam ¼ inch to the left of the drawn line, then ¼ inch from the right as in figure 1a.
- Press then cut as in figure 1b.
- Press open and trim to 4 x 4 inches if needed (fig 1c).
- Repeat with the remaining Fabric A and C squares to make 128 HST units.
- Repeat this process with the squares of fabric B and D to make 128
 B / D HST units.
- Yes....you will be making 256 HST....don't give up!



That is all for this month so get busy making those HST! Next month we will see how they are put together to make our design. If you have any questions, please email me at betsy@networkz.net. Please join the guild meeting via zoom on September 12th @ 10 am where we will be discussing any problems you might have and answer any questions. I will show you the fabric I have chosen and see some of the HST I have made. I hope you can find your fabric in your stash at homestay safe and stay home!
